I am really looking forward to seeing everyone at the President's Dinner meeting this month and receiving your leadership reports. The leadership project summary sheets have a list of projects that most clubs do concerning either parliamentary procedure or leadership guidance within your clubs. The form also provides room for you to list additional "different" projects that you have attached reports that relate to this department. I am always available to assist you with any questions you may have with report writing and you can also contact Kathy Znosko, Report Writing Chair.

Just a reminder to let you know that we are still looking for applicants for the corresponding secretary officer position. As mentioned in the February Bulletin, we received applications from members who wish to be nominated as an officer for the upcoming 2010-2012 term. The proposed slate of officers are: Ronnie Hollis, Director; Kathy Znosko, Assistant Director; Lois Wack, Recording Secretary; and Sue Spencer, Treasurer. We will announce the names for the proposed slate and close all nominations according to our bylaws at this meeting. The official election will be presented at Spring Conference. Anyone wishing to self-nominate themselves may do so with the following requirements:

Bylaw Article 11, Section B:

7. Eligibility for each office shall require membership in good standing in a CJW club. Candidates for the office of Director shall have served at least one full term in another CJW officer position. Candidates for other officer positions shall have served in at least one full term as a member of the CJW Board of Directors.

Nominations, other than those put forth by the Nominating Committee, will be taken from the floor at the March Executive Board meeting, after which, nominations shall be closed. Anyone who meets the eligibility requirements of an office may be nominated from the floor. If she did not self-nominate thru the nominating process, she must submit a completed self-nomination form (as found in the Blue Book) to the Nominating Chairman prior to accepting the nomination.

You may contact both Sheree and me with your intentions or with any questions you may have at any time prior to the March Board meeting. I would like to leave you with the following phrase that may help you with your leadership skills:

Go Green – Use: Recycle: Repeat

Thank you all who turn in reports at President's Dinner. I look forward to seeing what exciting things happened around the state to show that Connecticut Juniors really care about the environment and our communities by preserving, protecting and beautifying!

GOOD ADVICE COLUMN:

What to do with coffee grounds besides dump them in the trash?? For those who like to brew coffee at home, there

are many ways to recycle the grounds. Here are a few of my favorite ideas: *Spread them over flowerbeds containing acid-loving plants such as azaleas and rhododendrons. * Put dry grounds into an old margarine tub with holes poked in the lid. Place the tub in the refrigerator to absorb odors. *Keep grounds in a can near the sink. Rub a small amount over your hands after peeling onions, chopping garlic or handling fish to get rid of the odor.

Window Cleaning Solution: 1/2 c. ammonia, 1/2c. isopropyl rubbing alcohol and 1/2c water. Put the mixture in a spray bottle and label it very clearly. If you like, add a couple of drops of blue or green food coloring to aid in identification.

Pass and Play: most children tire of the same toys day after day. Instead of buying more which can be very expensive (as most of us know!) swap toys with a mom in your child's play group. Each mother brings a plastic tub of toys and then take turns "borrowing tubs" for a few weeks. This is a great way for your child to have "new toys" without breaking the bank.

For quick paint touch ups around the house: When you have painted a room a new color, before you clean up your supplies, pour some of the paint in to a small jar with a tight fitting lid (baby food jars are perfect for this). Label the jars as to which room used that paint or trim color and keep them in a cupboard or under the sink. Keep a supply of small brushes with them and when the need arises, do that quick touch up.

Before we know it Spring will be in the air. Now is a good time to get your seedlings started. Most of the stores having been selling seeds for several weeks now so you have a good variety to choose from. Plant a few extra seed pots and if your town has a community garden donate some plants to them if you do not have the time to tend the plot yourself.

The Center also oversees the Read.gov website at www.read.gov, which provides reading resources especially for kids and teens, as well as for adults, educators, and parents... In addition the website describes the Letters About Literature and River of Words contests for young people. It also offers booklists, classic books available on line, author web casts, and more.’

The statistics about social media has been increasing at a most impressive rate. In fact, social networking has replaced porn as the number one thing to do while online. One of the fastest growing demographic is females ages 35-55, us women and our love of socializing continues.

I was most fascinated by the speaker who covered LinkedIn. I have been a long-time member of the site (www.linkedin.com) as it is a great professional resource for an individual. However it has been a long while since I've really done anything more than accept someone's request to be in their network (LinkedIn's version of a friend request). So imagine my surprise when the speaker talked about the many groups you can join, that you can update your status and that you can pose questions for other users to answer! I of course signed on as soon as I got home.

Now, how can you use this for your club? There are many non-profit groups on the Linked-In with people ready, willing and able to answer questions and make contacts. You can also create a business profile so that people can know more about your business or create one for your Non-Profit Organization.

This is it, your last minute reminder! Reports are due Wednesday, March 10! Are yours ready? Or are you still working on them? Don't forget, you can't win awards at Spring Conference if you don't submit reports! Aren't there a few more projects that your club did that are worth sharing and possibly being noticed? You still have a little time to write those reports.

In these last few days, as you are finishing up your reports, here are the most important things to keep in mind:

1. All clubs MUST submit a President's Report.
2. Only submit ONE report for any given project.
3. Be sure to use the correct name for each CJW Department and Division.
4. Remember to refer to the Report Writing Guidelines in the Blue Book, or sent separately by CJW Corresponding Secretary, Lois Wack, for the physical presentation of the reports.
5. ALL REPORTS MUST BE ON ONE OF THE FORMS FOUND IN THE BLUE BOOK!
6. Project Reports must be no longer than one page. Anything over one page will not be judged.
7. Remember that it is the intent of the project that determines in which department the project should be reported.
8. All projects must have been completed between March 1, 2009 and February 28, 2010.
9. Use your full, proper club name on all pages.
10. Give as much information as possible, especially about any local organizations that the CJW Chairs might not know.
11. For insight on how those reports will be judged, read the Report Judging Guidelines in the Report Writing section of the Blue Book.
12. As always, if you have any questions or problems with the Report Writing process, please don't hesitate to contact me.
